By learning from the stories of others, we carry those important lessons forward. We allow them to guide us and embrace the pieces of our heritage that make us who we are.

THE STORIES THAT GUIDE US

In the not-too-distant future Holocaust Survivors will no longer be around to share their own stories. In Jewish tradition, we uphold the value of *L'dor v' Dor* which translates to: "From generation to generation". It is our responsibility as Jews to learn from those that came before us and to preserve their stories.

How can I give to support this important issue?

Judaism has many traditions around *Tzedakah* (righteous giving) and there are many different ways to give. So how can you decide? When we reflect on our own unique experiences; our personal stories, our families', our heritage, and our Jewish traditions and teachings, these different aspects become the guiding light we need to give with purpose and create change.

We have identified 3 major categories and ways to support Holocaust remembrance:

- Preserving the Legacy through Testimonials and Stories
- Supporting Emergency Needs of Holocaust Survivors Today
- Holocaust Education and Combatting Anti-Semitism

While these are all connected, there are many organizations that support different aspects of these needs. To make an informed decision, we encourage you to follow these steps outlined in this resource to guide your giving:

- Understand a survivor's unique story and how we are all connected as a Jewish people.
- 2 Explore Jewish values that resonate with you.
- 3 Choose an organization that supports your values.

Supporting Survivors Today

According to Kavod SHEF, recent studies indicate that of the 80,000 Holocaust survivors that are living today in the United States—more than 30,000 are living at or near poverty. The support these survivors receive does not allow them to afford what is needed to live a dignified life. Many are choosing between heat or food, medicine or rent. Others have dire living conditions because they cannot invest what is needed to repair their homes. Examples of emergency needs include things such as:

Dental, Vision, Medical, Food, Emergency Home Care (keeping them at home and live their days in dignity), Emergency Transportation (including getting survivors to get to their vaccinations), Emergency Home Services (emergency utilities, home repair, and rent support), PPE (COVID response), Delivery (COVID response).

When compared with the general population in their age demographic, Holocaust Survivors living at risk or below the poverty line are nearly double the poverty rates for the wider senior community. There are multiple factors that contribute to this discrepancy including the early trauma they experienced.

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What Jewish value can help guide my giving?

As you embark on the journey of doing this work, you will ultimately select one or two Jewish values that can help guide you. In learning of the hardships and atrocities of the Holocaust, you may wonder how you can take action. Start by selecting a Jewish value; explore where you want to give, let your value help center your decision and continue to refer back to that value.
